<u>RECOMMENDATION:</u> Staff recommends the City Council consider the Parks and Recreation Commission's and the City Council Skateboard Subcommittee's recommendations regarding the Culver City Skate Park regulations and operations and direct staff as deemed appropriate. <u>BACKGROUND:</u> In 1999, a group of teens and community members worked together to raise funds in order to provide local youth with a skateboard park. Due to lack of resources the facility was designed as a temporary skateboard park until funds could be identified to build a permanent skateboard park. On April 28, 2003 the City Council approved submission of a Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) grant application for funding a permanent skateboard park which was subsequently granted. On August 22, 2005, the City Council awarded a professional services agreement to SITE Design Group, Inc. to design a permanent Skateboard Park at Culver City Park and a final site plan was developed. At that time it was deemed necessary to expand the City's Municipal Code to include specific rules and regulations to better govern the activities at the skateboard park once it was completed. Staff researched skateboard park rules by reviewing adopted rules and regulations from a number of other cities and drafting proposed rules. The rules were then reviewed and considered as to applicability and legal liability exposure and approved			

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by the Parks, Recreation and Community Services Department; City Attorney's Office, and the Public Works Department.

At the August 7, 2007 Parks and Recreation Commission meeting, the Commission made a recommendation to City Council regarding (1) the introduction of an Ordinance amending Culver City Municipal Code Section 9.10.300 (B) to authorize the City Council to establish, by Resolution, Skateboard Park Rules and Regulations; and (2) adoption of a Resolution establishing Rules and Regulations regarding the use of Skateboard Parks within the City (4-0; Cooper absent). As part of the Commission's decision, it was also recommended that Section 1.i. of the proposed Resolution be clarified to state: "Skating is only permitted within the skateboard park and is prohibited in all other areas of Culver City Park, including its adjacent sidewalks, streets and parking lots."

With this modification, the proposed Ordinance was introduced and the Resolution was unanimously adopted by the City Council on October 13, 2007. The Ordinance was brought before the City Council for a second reading and was unanimously adopted on October 20, 2007. The Ordinance and Resolution as approved and adopted by Council are provided as Attachment 1 and Attachment 2, respectively.

As a result of the adoption and posting of the Skateboard Park Rules and Regulations, the City is in compliance with Section 115800 of the California Health and Safety Code and, therefore, the City can classify skateboarding as a "hazardous recreational activity" and qualify for certain immunity to liability with respect to this type of activity.

DISCUSSION:

The Culver City Skate Park had a "soft opening" on Saturday, September 15, 2007. The purpose of the soft (or "unofficial") opening was to see how well the Skate Park would work and be used by skaters and also to identify any construction or other issues that might need to be addressed or corrected before the Official Grand Opening on Saturday, October 27, 2007.

During the interval between the Skate Park's "soft opening" and the Official Grand Opening, staff, the Parks and Recreation Commission, and the City Council have received comments and questions from the public regarding the Skate Park's regulations and the supervision of skaters. This topic was discussed within the larger discussion of safety on streets within Culver City Park at the October 2, 2007 Commission meeting. Public concern about the enforcement of the Skate Park's posted rules and regulations, specifically the requirement that helmets and pads be worn while skating, was also mentioned briefly during a joint meeting of the Parks and Recreation Commission with the City Council on October 15, 2007.

In response to these concerns, staff met on October 16th and 25th, and a joint meeting of the Council Skate Park subcommittee, the Commission Skate Park

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subcommittee and staff will held on November 1, 2007. The draft minutes of the joint meeting of the City Council and Parks and Recreation Commission Skate Park Subcommittees are provided as Attachment 5. General comments resulting from the November 1, 2007 joint Skate Park Subcommittee meeting and PRCS staff's recommendations to the Parks and Recreation Commission are provided as Attachment 6.

In summary, the City Council Subcommittee recommended the following:

- (1) Continue to operate the Skateboard Park as an unsupervised park as outlined in State Law;
- (2) Continue to enforce the existing Skateboard Park rules and regulations as approved by the City Council, including locking the Skateboard Park between the hours of dusk and dawn;
- (3) Improve the visibility of the locking mechanism by improving the mechanism and installing a light fixture illuminating the entrance area;
- (4) Improve enforcement through the use of periodic sweeps;
- (5) Prepare large, banner-type signage re-enforcing the benefits of wearing proper protective gear; and
- (6) Work with local businesses to offer an incentive-based program for users of the Skateboard Park who comply with the Ordinance (wearing of helmets and pads)

The Subcommittee Members (Vice-Mayor Gross and Councilmember Rose) may wish to provide further comments to the City Council.

At the November 6, 2007 Parks and Recreation Commission meeting, the Commission discussed recommendations from the Council/Commission Skate Park subcommittees meeting of November 1, 2007 where the topic of Skate Park regulations and supervision were discussed. The Commission took action (4-0-0 / Commissioner Deen excused absence) to make the following recommendation to Council:

1. That the Culver City Skate Park remain unsupervised, and
2. That the Skate Park will be locked when the Park is closed, and
3. That there is an increase in frequency of the enforcement of the Skate Park Rules and Regulations, possibly through periodic sweeps and observations, and
4. That incentives be explored to encourage compliance with the Skate Park Rules and Regulations in a positive manner, and
5. That additional signage be installed calling out the requirement of wearing helmets, knee and elbow pads while skating.

Staff would concur with the recommendations provided by the City Council Subcommittee and the Parks and Recreation Commission. The results of implementing these recommendations would improve the operations of the skateboard park while maintaining the protections provided in state law.

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FISCAL ANALYSIS

The cost of additional signage is estimated as \$750. The cost estimate for the light installation is \$1,000. Sufficient funding is available in CIP Project 41900830 – Skateboard Park Project, to fund these items. Costs associated with additional random enforcement would be absorbed in current appropriations within the Police Department and Enforcement Services Division budgets.

**Discussion and Consideration of the Parks and Recreation
Commission's and City Council Skateboard Subcommittee's
Recommendations Regarding the Skate Park Regulations and Supervision**

The following members of the audience addressed the City Council:

Cary Anderson, regarding what he feels is a lack of safety enforcement at the Culver City Skate Park and played a DVD to demonstrate the problem.

Tina Anderson, offering various solutions to increase safety at the Culver City Skate Park.

William La Pointe, Director of Parks, Recreation and Community Services gave the staff report.

Discussion ensued regarding safety concerns; signage and liability; supervision and enforcement; police presence and policy; the difference between non-supervised and enforced, and the immunity problem that comes with supervision; parental responsibility; effective communication with young skaters; and whether to charge admission to the park.

Councilmember Gross proposed a motion per the staff recommendation.

Councilmember Rose seconded the motion.

Further discussion ensued regarding comparisons of safety and liability issues between the pool and skate park and the applicable

California Health and Safety Code; possible outsourcing of skate park management; methods of securing the park at night; safety enforcement approaches used by other cities; and arguments in favor of park supervision.

Councilmember Silbiger moved to supervise the skate park; lock the skate park during hours of non-operation; prepare large, banner-type signage reinforcing the benefits of wearing proper protective gear; and work with local businesses to offer an incentive-based program for users of the Skateboard Park who comply with the ordinance (wearing of helmets and pads). The motion died for lack of a second.

Discussion ensued between the City Council and staff regarding scheduling a meeting between certain staff and Council members to study options; other unsupervised skate parks in neighboring cities; problems with over-regulation; additional lighting at the front gate; alternative overnight security ideas; levels of police enforcement; and community service for skate park rule violators.

Following discussion, the following motion was made:

MOVED BY COUNCILMEMBER GROSS AND SECONDED BY COUNCILMEMBER ROSE,
THAT THE CITY COUNCIL:

CONSIDER THE RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE CITY COUNCIL SKATEBOARD SUBCOMMITTEE AND THE PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION RELATED TO THE OPERATIONS OF THE SKATEBOARD PARK; AND

DIRECT STAFF TO IMPLEMENT THE FOLLOWING: (A) CONTINUE TO OPERATE THE SKATEBOARD PARK AS AN UNSUPERVISED PARK AS OUTLINED IN STATE LAW; (B) CONTINUE TO ENFORCE THE EXISTING SKATEBOARD PARK RULES AND REGULATIONS AS APPROVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL, INCLUDING LOCKING THE SKATEBOARD PARK BETWEEN THE HOURS OF DUSK AND DAWN; (C) IMPROVE ENFORCEMENT THROUGH THE USE OF PERIODIC SWEEPS; (D) IMPROVE THE VISIBILITY OF THE LOCKING MECHANISM BY IMPROVING THE MECHANISM AND INSTALLING A LIGHT FIXTURE ILLUMINATING THE ENTRANCE AREA; (E) PREPARE LARGE, BANNER-TYPE SIGNAGE RE-ENFORCING THE BENEFITS OF WEARING PROPER PROTECTIVE GEAR; AND (F) WORK WITH LOCAL BUSINESSES TO OFFER AN INCENTIVE-BASED PROGRAM FOR USERS OF THE SKATEBOARD PARK WHO COMPLY WITH THE ORDINANCE (WEARING OF HELMETS AND PADS).

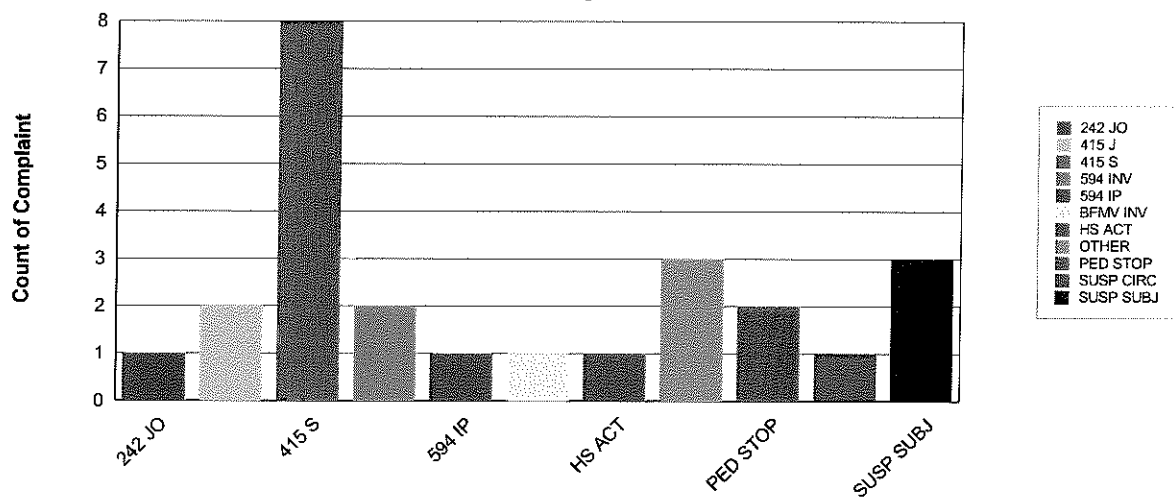

Phoenix Expands Its Award-Winning Anti-Graffiti Program

The City of Phoenix has one of the most active and well organized anti-graffiti programs of any city in the U.S. Phoenix covers 520 square miles with a population of about 1.5 million. Last year the Neighbor Services Department, (NSD), cleaned up approximately 64,000 sites and is expected this year to clean approximately 90,000 sites. They have ten (going to 14) completely equipped trucks with sprayers, high pressure washers with 100 gallons of water. In addition they have a lift truck for high work and is used to install and service the FlashCAM systems the city uses.

In 2001 Phoenix added FlashCAM-530s (film/battery version) to their arsenal of tools to fight graffiti. Later these systems were upgraded to the FlashCAM-770. According to Bruce Nelson, Manager at NSD, the Q-Star systems really became an effective tool with the introduction of the FlashCAM-770 because of the dramatic reduction in service costs due to the solar power and a digital camera that could hold up to 1,000 pictures. The city recently ordered **40 FlashCAM-770 and 40 Dummy systems** for a new pilot program that will work directly with neighbor associations in the city. Bruce reports the pilot plan involves signing a memorandum

of agreement with specific neighbor associations. NSD will install the FlashCAM systems in an association's area. The neighbor association working with NSD and the Police Department will be responsible for selecting sites and then monitoring camera activity. The Neighbor Services Dept. will service the equipment and move the units as needed using a shell game to chase graffiti vandals out of the area. Any photographs captured will be under the control of NSD and will be turned over to the police department.

Part of the plan is to keep accurate records on the cost effectiveness of the FlashCAM's plus an aggressive public relations program to keep the public informed of results. For more information about Phoenix's anti-graffiti program go to:

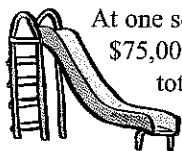

Halting School Vandalism & Thefts

Saugus Union School District, northwest of Los Angeles, CA, was having problems at their construction site.

Construction materials were being stolen; classrooms were being broken into and vandalized.



At one school there was an arson incident where \$75,000 worth of playground equipment was totally destroyed. They were able to catch the kids that did this using standard investigation techniques, but the kids

were without playground equipment for several weeks.

Keith Karzin, Director of Safety and Risk Management, decided stop to the carnage. He reports that since FlashCAM-880's were installed, they have had no problems of any kind. Keith said, "Using the FlashCAMs has been a very positive experience. The Q-Star staff has provided great support and the systems work great as a deterrent."

Also Keith mentioned was how simple it was to set up and use the FlashCAMs compared to video systems. He said, "There are two issues with video systems. One is the high cost to install and wire a campus and the other is privacy concerns of parents at having the video recorder running all the time. The event driven nature of the FlashCAM takes away the privacy issue. And the solar power, stand alone nature and portability of the FlashCAMs save the school a lot of money."

Keith said, "We also supply all the custodial staff with disposable cameras. Every time they see a kid on campus after hours they take a picture. These pictures have been useful in some cases to identify vandals." This is a good tip that other schools might want to consider. ▲

Team Effort Results in Prosecutions

Indio, CA is a fast growing city of 70,000 people. Along with this growth comes an increase in city problems such as graffiti and vandalism. The City of Indio started addressing these problems with four FlashCAM-880's. According to Captain Joe Roberts, the systems have worked so well for Indio PD that they recently took delivery of 13 more units. The initial application was graffiti. Then they started to have a rash of copper thefts at the nine parks in town. Thieves opened electrical junction boxes at buildings and at park lights and ripped out the copper wire. This type of theft is very expensive due to the cost of people and materials that is required to replace the wiring.

In the graffiti application officers from the police department work directly with the abatement crews from public works and school resource officers. Together the team has been effective at catching and prosecuting graffiti vandals. ▲



FlashCAM's Used to Prevent Crime

Monessen, a town of 11,000 in southwestern Pennsylvania, has all the issues facing larger cities—graffiti, vandalism, thefts. They purchased three FlashCAM-880s and one dummy unit to address these problems. These systems are used for the full range of applications the FC-880s have become known for. But according to Terry Halinka, Director of Streets, they are also used to deter parking meter theft, and preventing vandalism to restrooms at the boat launch. There has also been occasions when vacant houses have been broken into and stripped of copper wire and plumbing.

Terry said they really like the fact that the systems are easy to install and move. Their strategy is to keep moving the systems as trouble spots occur. According to Terry, the primary motivation for the city to buy the FlashCAM systems was as a cost saving strategy in an era of shrinking budgets for city maintenance. So far this strategy is working great! ▲

Fighting Graffiti and Trash Dumping in Central CA

The San Joaquin County Sheriff's office has 1,400 square miles to patrol with a growing graffiti and illegal trash dumping problem. The county currently spends about \$750,000 a year for graffiti and illegal trash clean up. They purchased four FlashCAM-880 and two dummy systems to test their effectiveness for deterring these problems.

The results are in and Bill Hughes, Abatement Coordinator with the Patrol Division of the Sheriff's Dept. says, "They are working great!" The first FC-880 was installed at the worst graffiti site in the county. Graffiti stopped immediately. After a month the FlashCAM was replaced with a dummy unit and the location has remained graffiti free for almost nine months.

Two of the FlashCAMs are used for graffiti and the other two for illegal trash dumping. Their positive experience is the same with both applications. When the camera system is installed the problem stops. The Sheriff's department works closely with the Public Works department. The Sheriff's department determines where the systems get installed and monitors them; public works installs and moves them. The next stage of this project is to add more dummy systems and then evaluate how much the money this program is saving the county each year. ▲

New Mexico Sheriff's Dept. Puts a Crimp in Crime

Sheriff Greg Solono, Santa Fe, NM has two FlashCAM-880 systems. One is installed on a youth center and one is at a community center. In both cases the problem was graffiti vandalism. The FlashCAM-880 stopped the problem immediately. The plan is to purchase a couple of dummy systems and move the FlashCAM-880s to new locations. They do not have any measure of the cost savings as a result of using the FlashCAMs, but according to Sheriff Solono, "We are definitely saving the county money. Q-Star support is very good and we are pleased with the results we are getting from this program." ▲

Nevada Law Stiffens Penalty for Graffiti Offenders

The Reno Police Department is a long time Q-Star customer. Over the years they have purchased about every model of FlashCAM we offer and recently they upgraded some of their older models to the wireless FlashCAM-880. Reno continues its proactive plan to deal with graffiti which recently got a boost by a change in the law to more effectively punish graffiti vandals. The monetary level for a citation has been raised from \$200 to \$750 per offense. So now when a kid is caught he will have to pay \$750 for each citation and lose his drivers license for one year if he is over 18. In addition perpetrators are required to perform community service. The money collected in Reno is used to pay court and administrative costs and then some of it is used to fund the ongoing graffiti program. ▲



FlashCAM Stops Thefts at Electric Utility Construction Site

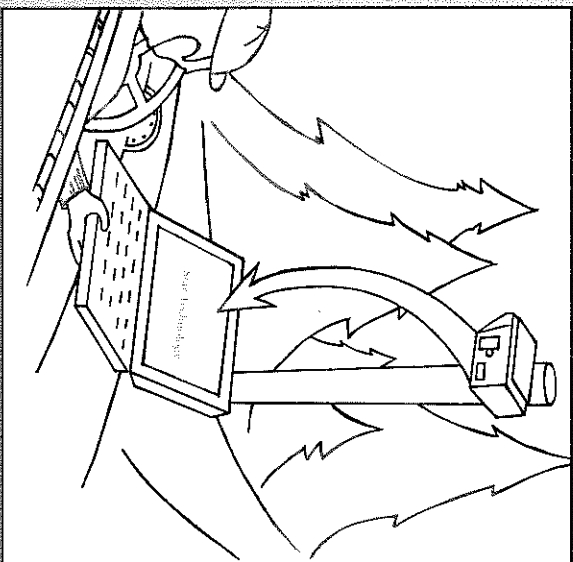
Roseville Municipal Electric, Roseville, CA is building a new substation to support population growth. It's a two-phase project with private contractors doing the civil work and Municipal employees doing all the electrical work. During the construction process, they do not have hardwired security cameras installed. The problem was theft of copper and other building materials. Richard Smith, spokesman for the electric utility, says they purchased a FlashCAM-770 to protect their building site. Since it was installed, Richard reports there have been no thefts with the FlashCAM on guard. ▲

Update From Coachella Water

Long-time Q-Star customer, Kevin Jones, Coachella Water, reports, "Our FlashCAM-530 is still doing yeoman's duty at a pumping station that is located in the middle of a tract of homes. The problem we had before the FlashCAM was installed — kids breaking into the pump house and having pizza and beer parties or vandalizing the equipment. The FlashCAM stopped all of that."

What are Kevin's plans for the future. "We are now looking at getting a FlashCAM-880 to stop illegal trash dumping. Trash gets dumped in our emergency overflow channels which must be kept clear." ▲

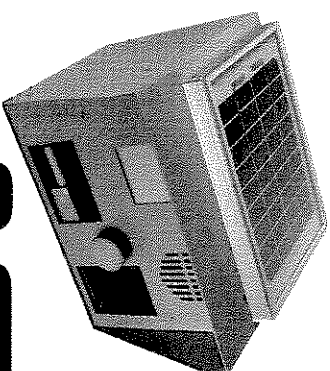

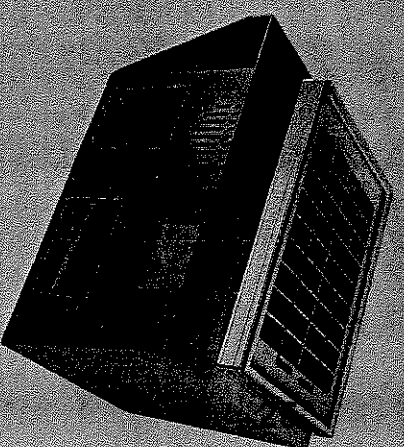
