5       **RECOVERY: INTERIOR MALL STORES MAY OPEN FOR**  
6       **CURBSIDE SERVICE; CAR PARADES PERMITTED); MAY 27,**  
7       **2020 FIFTEENTH SUPPLEMENT TO PUBLIC ORDER (SAFER**  
8       **AT WORK AND IN THE COMMUNITY; CONTINUED WAIVER OF**  
9       **OUTDOOR DINING AND VALET PARKING LICENSE FEES) AND**  
10       **JUNE 1, 2020 SIXTEENTH SUPPLEMENT TO PUBLIC ORDER**  
11       **(REOPENING SAFER AT WORK AND IN THE COMMUNITY FOR**  
12       **CONTROL OF COVID-19: RESTAURANT IN-PERSON DINING**  
13       **AND HAIR SALONS/BARBER SHOPS), ISSUED BY THE CITY**  
14       **MANAGER, AS DIRECTOR OF EMERGENCY SERVICES,**  
15       **UNDER CITY OF CULVER CITY EMERGENCY AUTHORITY,**  
16       **DUE TO THE CORONAVIRUS RESPIRATORY DISEASE (COVID-**  
17       **19) PANDEMIC.**

18               WHEREAS, since February 2020, the City of Culver City has been part of a  
19 coordinated response involving the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the  
20 California Department of Public Health, and the Los Angeles County Department of Public  
21 Health as a result of the rapidly evolving multinational outbreak of the coronavirus respiratory  
22 disease (COVID-19); and

23               WHEREAS, pursuant to the authority granted by Culver City Municipal Code  
24 (CCMC) Section 3.09.020, on March 14, 2020, the City Manager, as the Director of  
25 Emergency Services, issued a Proclamation of Local Emergency due to the outbreak and  
26 spread of Coronavirus (COVID-19), which was ratified by the City Council on March 18, 2020  
27 by Resolution No. 2020-R015. Such action followed the Los Angeles County Department of  
28 Public Health's and the Chair of the Board of Supervisor's declarations of a local health

1 emergency and the State of California's declaration of a State of Emergency on March 4,  
2 2020, and the declaration of a National Emergency on March 13, 2020; and

3 WHEREAS, as of June 2, 2020, Johns Hopkins University reported 6,333,760  
4 confirmed COVID-19 cases globally and 78,240 deaths; 1,827,206 cases nationally, with  
5 106,028 deaths; and 115,908 cases in California, with 4,235 deaths. Further, as of June 2,  
6 2020, the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health reported 57,118 cases in Los  
7 Angeles County with 2,443 deaths, which includes 161 cases and 20 deaths in Culver City.  
8 As there is a rapid increase in cases and ongoing significant risk of infection throughout the  
9 United States and the State of California, the federal Centers for Disease Control and  
10 Prevention and the California Department of Public Health are recommending that counties  
11 and cities throughout the U.S. continue to actively address the COVID-19 pandemic and  
12 implement aggressive measures to prevent the spread of COVID-19; and  
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15 WHEREAS, on March 16, 2020, under the authority of CCMC Section 3.09.020,  
16 the City Manager issued a Public Order enacting new City measures to protect members of  
17 the public and City workers from undue risk of COVID-19 ("March 16 Order"). The March 16  
18 Order included, among other things, temporary restrictions on certain establishments  
19 throughout Culver City, in which large numbers of people tend to gather and remain in close  
20 proximity; and  
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22 WHEREAS, on March 20, 2020, the City Manager issued a First Supplement to  
23 Public Order enacting further City measures to protect members of the public and City workers  
24 from undue risk of COVID-19 ("March 20 Order"). The March 20 Order was enacted after the  
25 City of Los Angeles and Los Angeles County Department of Public Health issued a similar  
26 public order. The March 20 Order issued, and incorporated by reference, any and all orders  
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1 set forth in *Public Order Under City of Los Angeles Emergency Authority, Subject: SAFER AT*  
2 *HOME*, issued by Los Angeles Mayor Eric Garcetti on March 19, 2020; and

3 WHEREAS, since the March 19 *SAFER AT HOME* Order, Los Angeles Mayor  
4 Garcetti issued revised *SAFER AT HOME* Orders on April 1, April 10, and April 27, 2020. In  
5 step with the City of Los Angeles, on April 7, 2020, April 11, 2020, and May 1, 2020  
6 respectively, the City Manager issued a Fourth Supplement to Public Order (incorporating the  
7 April 1 *SAFER AT HOME* Order), a Seventh Supplement to Public Order (incorporating the  
8 April 10 *SAFER AT HOME* Order), and a Ninth Supplement to Public Order (incorporating the  
9 April 27 *SAFER AT HOME* Order); and

10  
11 WHEREAS, on May 7, 2020, the City Manager issued a Tenth Supplement to  
12 Public Order consistent with the Los Angeles County Roadmap to Recovery (May 7 Order),  
13 permitting florists, toy stores, clothing stores, music stores, and sporting goods stores to open  
14 for curbside pick-up, and auto dealer showrooms were permitted to open, with strict physical  
15 distancing and infection control protocols in place; and

16  
17 WHEREAS, on May 14, 2020 the City Manager issued an Eleventh Supplement  
18 to Public Order (May 14 Order), to align with the County of Los Angeles' Health Officer May  
19 13<sup>th</sup> *Safer at Home Order for Control of COVID-19*, and extended all previous orders until  
20 further notice, except where noted, and permitting certain limited re-openings with curbside  
21 pick-up or walk-up service only; the Order included wearing a cloth face covering whenever  
22 there is or can be contact with others who are non-household members, in both public and  
23 private places, and the Order additionally extended relaxation of parking restrictions and  
24 signage restrictions to facilitate the curbside pickup, and extended the fee waiver for outdoor  
25 dining fees and valet parking fees, until June 30, 2020; and  
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1           WHEREAS, consistent with the County of Los Angeles and City of Los Angeles,  
2 on May 20, 2020, the City Manager issued a Thirteen Supplement to Public Order (May 20  
3 Order), to address and allow conditional pet grooming, pet training and car washes that were  
4 previously prohibited under earlier *SAFER AT HOME* Orders; and

5           WHEREAS, on May 22, 2020, the City Manager, in his capacity as Director of  
6 Emergency Services, issued the Fourteenth Supplement to Public Order, consistent with the  
7 County of Los Angeles Public Health Order, to allow lower risk retailers located in the interior  
8 of an indoor mall or shopping center to provide goods and services to the public via curbside,  
9 door-side, or other outdoor or outside pick-up, or via delivery, and also to allow individuals to  
10 participate in vehicle based parades under certain conditions; and

11           WHEREAS, on May 27, 2020, the City Manager, in his capacity as Director of  
12 Emergency Services, issued the Fifteenth Supplement to Public Order, to align the City's  
13 Orders with the County of Los Angeles Public Health Order issued May 26<sup>th</sup>, allowing the  
14 phased reopening of designated sectors, including permitting lower risk businesses to open  
15 for business at 50% occupancy; non-essential office-based businesses to reopen; faith based  
16 organizations to resume in-person services at 25% maximum occupancy or 100 persons,  
17 whichever is lower; pools and hot tubs in a multi-unit residence or Homeowners Association to  
18 open; in-person protests, with certain conditions; and the outdoor dining license fees and valet  
19 parking license fees were waived through August 31, 2020; and

20           WHEREAS, on June 1, 2020, the City Manager, in his capacity as Director of  
21 Emergency Services, issued the Sixteenth Supplement to Public Order, to continue to align  
22 with the County of Los Angeles as it moves through Stage 2 of the reopening, allowing hair  
23 salons and barbershops to reopen with conditions; restaurants and other food facilities to  
24



1 reopen for in-person dining at 60% capacity; and allowing restaurants and retailers to  
2 temporarily expand into the public right-of-way, subject to the approval of the Public Works  
3 Director/City Engineer, who was granted the discretion to establish procedures, standards,  
4 conditions, rules and regulations to protect the public health, safety and welfare.

5           NOW, THEREFORE, the City Council of the City of Culver City, California,  
6 DOES HEREBY RESOLVE as follows:  
7

8           1.       Pursuant to CCMC Section 3.09.020.B.1.h(2), the City Council hereby  
9 confirms the Fourteenth Supplement to Public Order issued by the Director of Emergency  
10 Services on May 22, 2020, attached hereto as Exhibit A and incorporated herein as though  
11 fully set forth.

12           2.       Pursuant to CCMC Section 3.09.020.B.1.h(2), the City Council hereby  
13 confirms the Fifteenth Supplement to Public Order issued by the Director of Emergency  
14 Services on May 27, 2020, attached hereto as Exhibit B and incorporated herein as though  
15 fully set forth.

16           3.       Pursuant to CCMC Section 3.09.020.B.1.h(2), the City Council hereby  
17 confirms the Sixteenth Supplement to Public Order issued by the Director of Emergency  
18 Services on June 1, 2020, attached hereto as Exhibit C and incorporated herein as though  
19 fully set forth.

20           4.       The City Council finds that this Resolution is not subject to the California  
21 Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") pursuant to CEQA guidelines, California Code of  
22 Regulations, Title 14, Chapter 3, §15060(c)(2) [the activity will not result in a direct or  
23 reasonably foreseeable indirect physical change in the environment] and §15060(c)(3) [the  
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1 activity is not a project as defined in §15378] because it has no potential for resulting in  
2 physical change to the environment, directly or indirectly.

3 5. This Resolution shall take effective immediately upon its adoption.



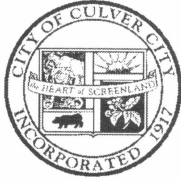

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**Fourteenth Supplement to Public Order Under  
City of Culver City Emergency Authority**

**Issue Date: May 22, 2020**

**Subject: City Measures to Address COVID-19 Road to Recovery:  
Interior Mall Stores May Open for Curbside Service;  
Car Parades Permitted**

On May 22, 2020, Los Angeles County announced new openings in advance of the holiday weekend, allowing increased outdoor and retail activities for residents. Beach bike paths are now open, indoor malls may open for curbside service, and vehicle parades will be allowed, all subject to certain conditions.

Effective as of the date of this Order, and by virtue of authority vested in me as the Director of Emergency Services, pursuant to the provisions of CCMC Section 3.09.020.B.1.h(2), to make and issue rules and regulations on matters reasonably related to the protection of persons, property and the environment as affected by such emergency, I hereby order:

1. The City of Culver City will permit lower risk retailers located within the interior of an indoor mall or shopping center, to provide goods and services to the public via curbside, door-side, or other outdoor or outside pick-up, or via delivery. Businesses that are normally accessible by the public from the exterior of the indoor mall or shopping center may continue to provide curbside pick-up, as set forth in my May 14, 2020 Eleventh Supplement to Public Order. Retail establishments and their customers shall practice social distancing and wear face coverings, and the businesses must also be in compliance with the conditions laid out in the most recent version of the Los Angeles County Public Health Checklist for Retail Establishments Opening for Curbside Pickup (Appendix B) posted on <http://publichealth.lacounty.gov/media/coronavirus/>. Shopping malls must create clearly-marked curbside or outside pickup points that maintain physical distance with visual cues or other measures, and have purchased goods available there for pick-up, or available through home delivery. Retailers located within a mall may take orders and deliver goods to the public outside of the mall from these marked locations. Businesses are required to adhere to all Culver City and Los Angeles County public health guidelines, including physical distancing and infection control practices to protect employees and customers. Members of the public are not permitted inside an indoor mall or shopping center.

2. Individuals may leave their residences to participate in a vehicle-based parade. The host of the vehicle-based parade shall comply with all Culver City Municipal Code provisions, traffic control requirements, and state laws. The host of the vehicle-based parade shall comply with the most recent version of the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health Protocol for Vehicle Based Parades posted on <http://publichealth.lacounty.gov/media/coronavirus/>. Participants are required to adhere to all Culver City and Los Angeles County public health guidelines, including physical distancing, wearing face coverings, and infection control practices.
3. Except as specifically modified or amended by this Fourteenth Supplement to Public Order, this Order in addition to, and does not supersede nor replace, any previously issued orders, which shall remain in full force and effect. All Stay at Home orders remain in place. Public and private gatherings of any number of people occurring outside of a single household or living unit continue to be prohibited.
4. Additional social distancing, infection control, and health and safety measures and guidelines may be imposed at any time, in my sole discretion, in order to ensure the protection of the public's health and safety, and the intent of each and every Public Order is carried out.

Any violation of this Fourteenth Supplement to Public Order may be enforced under the CCMC, which provides for fines not to exceed \$1,000 or imprisonment not to exceed six months. Each individual officer should use their discretion in enforcing this order and always keep the intent of the order in mind.

This Fourteenth Supplement to Public Order shall be effective immediately and shall remain in effect until superseded, amended, modified or rescinded.

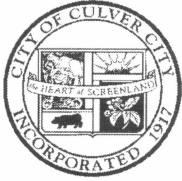

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### Fifteenth Supplement to Public Order Under City of Culver City Emergency Authority

Issue Date: May 27, 2020

**Subject: City Measures on Reopening Safer at Work and in the Community for Control of COVID-19; Continued Waiver of Outdoor Dining and Valet Parking License Fees**

On May 26, 2020, the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health announced its "Reopening Safer at Work and in the Community for Control of COVID 19: Moving the County of Los Angeles through Stage 2 of California's Pandemic Resilience Roadmap" (County Order). Under this new County Order, the County of Los Angeles is aligned with the State of California's phased re-opening that progressively designates sectors, businesses, establishments or activities that may reopen or resume, with necessary modifications to protect the health and safety of the community, and to lower the risk of transmission of Novel Coronavirus Disease (COVID-19).

To allow activities to resume, and Culver City businesses to safely re-open as the County permits, effective as of the date of this Order, and by virtue of authority vested in me as the Director of Emergency Services, pursuant to the provisions of CCMC Section 3.09.020.B.1.h(2), to make and issue rules and regulations on matters reasonably related to the protection of persons, property and the environment as affected by such emergency, I hereby order:

1. All lower risk retail establishments, as listed and defined in Section 9 of the County Order, including those located in indoor and outdoor malls and shopping centers, may open for business at 50% capacity. Businesses must prepare, implement, distribute to each employee, and post at each public entrance the most recent version of the Los Angeles County Public Health Checklist for Retail Establishments (Appendix B) posted on <http://publichealth.lacounty.gov/media/coronavirus/>. Businesses are required to adhere to all Culver City and Los Angeles County Public Health guidelines, including physical distancing and infection control practices to protect employees and customers.
2. The owner or operator of an indoor mall or shopping center must, prior to re-opening, prepare, implement, distribute to each employee and post at each public entrance the required Los Angeles County Public Health Protocols for Shopping Center Operators (Appendix E) posted on



<http://publichealth.lacounty.gov/media/coronavirus/>. Retail food businesses including food court businesses, shall comply with all Public Health Officer orders. Dine-in service is not permitted. Movie theaters, bars, spas, salons or other personal care services within the mall or shopping center must remain closed. Children's play areas must remain closed. Businesses are required to adhere to all Culver City and Los Angeles County Public Health guidelines, including physical distancing and infection control practices to protect employees and customers.

3. Non-essential office-based businesses may re-open, although teleworking is strongly recommended and encouraged. Prior to re-opening, businesses shall prepare, implement, distribute to each employee and post at each public entrance the required Los Angeles County Public Health Re-opening Protocol for Office Based Worksites (Appendix D), posted on <http://publichealth.lacounty.gov/media/coronavirus/>. Businesses are required to adhere to all Culver City and Los Angeles County public health guidelines, including physical distancing and infection control practices to protect employees and customers.
4. Faith-based organizations may resume in-person services, provided that the gathering of congregants is limited to 25% of the total maximum occupancy of occupant load (as assigned on its Certificate of Occupancy or as assigned by the Building Official under the Building Code), or a maximum of 100 people, whichever is lower. Faith based organizations holding in-person services must prepare, implement, distribute to each staff member and post at each public entrance the Los Angeles County Public Health Places of Worship Protocol (Appendix F) posted on <http://publichealth.lacounty.gov/media/coronavirus/>. Faith based organizations are required to adhere to all Culver City and Los Angeles County Public Health guidelines, including physical distancing and infection control practices to protect employees and customers.
5. Pools, hot tubs and saunas that are in a multi-unit residence or part of a Homeowners Association are permitted to re-open. All County of Los Angeles Public Health and Culver City physical distancing and infection control practices must be adhered to, to protect the occupants.
6. In-person protests are permitted as long as attendance is limited to 25% of the relevant area's maximum occupancy, as defined by the local permitting authority or other relevant authority, or a maximum of 100 attendees, whichever is lower. Physical distancing of at least six feet between persons or groups of persons from different households must be maintained at all times, and face coverings must be worn by participants.

7. Entertainment industry studios and other related production establishments may resume upon authorization of the State of California Public Health Officer, and only with adherence to all State, County of Los Angeles and City issued protocols.
8. As set forth in the March 20, April 11, and May 14 Order, outdoor dining license fees and valet parking license fees will continue to be waived, through August 31, 2020, or the termination of the Local Emergency, whichever occurs earlier.
9. This Fifteenth Supplement to Public Order supersedes any provision in a previous Order where there is a conflict between the Orders; otherwise all Stay at Home orders remain in place. Except as specifically provided herein, public and private gatherings of any number of people occurring outside of a single household or living unit continue to be prohibited.
10. Additional social distancing, infection control, and health and safety measures and guidelines may be imposed at any time, in my sole discretion, in order to ensure the protection of the public's health and safety, and the intent of each and every Public Order is carried out.

Any violation of this Fifteenth Supplement to Public Order may be enforced under the CCMC, which provides for fines not to exceed \$1,000 or imprisonment not to exceed six months. Each individual officer should use their discretion in enforcing this order and always keep the intent of the order in mind.

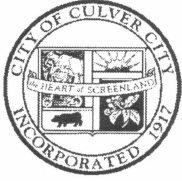

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**Sixteenth Supplement to Public Order Under  
City of Culver City Emergency Authority**

**Issue Date: June 1, 2020**

**Subject: Reopening Safer at Work and in the Community for Control of COVID-19: Restaurant In-person Dining and Hair Salons/Barber Shops**

On May 29, 2020, the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health revised its "Reopening Safer at Work and in the Community for Control of COVID 19: Moving the County of Los Angeles through Stage 2 of California's Pandemic Resilience Roadmap" (Revised County Order), to allow additional businesses to conditionally re-open. The County of Los Angeles is following the State of California's phased re-opening that progressively designates sectors, businesses, establishments or activities that may reopen or resume, with necessary modifications to protect the public health and safety, and to lower the risk of transmission of Novel Coronavirus Disease (COVID-19).

To allow activities to resume, and Culver City businesses to safely re-open as the County permits, effective as of the date of this Order, and by virtue of authority vested in me as the Director of Emergency Services, pursuant to the provisions of CCMC Section 3.09.020.B.1.h(2), to make and issue rules and regulations on matters reasonably related to the protection of persons, property and the environment as affected by such emergency, I hereby order:

1. Hair salons and barbershops are permitted to conditionally re-open, as lower risk businesses, as defined in Section 9 of the Revised County Order. The owner, manager or operator of a hair salon or barbershop shall, prior to re-opening, prepare, implement and post the most recent version of the Los Angeles County Public Health Reopening Protocol for Hair Salons and Barbershops (Appendix H) posted on <http://publichealth.lacounty.gov/media/coronavirus/>. Businesses are required to adhere to all Culver City, Los Angeles County Public Health, and State of California Public Health Officer guidelines, including physical distancing and infection control practices to protect employees and customers.
2. Restaurants and other food facilities that prepare and serve food may re-open for in-person dining, at a capacity not to exceed 60% of maximum occupancy. Restaurants and other food facilities that provide in-person dining shall prepare, implement and post the most recent version of the Los Angeles County Public Health Protocol for Restaurants Opening for On-site Dining (Appendix I) posted on <http://publichealth.lacounty.gov/media/coronavirus/>. Businesses are required to




adhere to all Culver City, Los Angeles County Public Health, and State of California Public Health Officer guidelines, including physical distancing and infection control practices to protect employees and customers.

3. Notwithstanding any provisions of the Culver City Municipal Code to the contrary, in order to accommodate restaurants re-opening at a capacity not to exceed 60% of maximum occupancy, and lower risk retail stores re-opening at a capacity not to exceed 50% of maximum occupancy, during the course of the local emergency, and subject to the approval of the Public Works Director/City Engineer:
  - (a) Restaurants may temporarily expand in-person dining into the public right-of-way, or expand the existing outdoor dining areas further into the public right-of-way.
  - (b) Retail establishments may temporarily use the public right-of-way for the outdoor display of goods.
4. In order to effectuate this Public Order, the Public Works Director/City Engineer shall have the authority and discretion to establish procedures, standards, conditions, rules and regulations, as he may deem appropriate, to implement the processing and approval of such temporary outdoor dining and retail areas (including, but not limited to approval of street closures, or partial street closures), while ensuring compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), and any other measures deemed necessary to protect the public health, safety and welfare.
5. Outdoor dining permit fees will continue to be waived pursuant to existing public orders. In addition, temporary use permit fees, for the purposes and duration of this Public Order, shall be waived.
6. This Sixteenth Supplement to Public Order supersedes any provision in a previous Order where there is a conflict between the Orders; otherwise all Stay at Home orders remain in place. Except as specifically provided herein, public and private gatherings of any number of people occurring outside of a single household or living unit continue to be prohibited.
7. Additional social distancing, infection control, and health and safety measures and guidelines may be imposed at any time, in my sole discretion, in order to ensure the protection of the public's health and safety, and the intent of each and every Public Order is carried out.

Any violation of this Sixteenth Supplement to Public Order may be enforced under the CCMC, which provides for fines not to exceed \$1,000 or imprisonment not to exceed six months. Each individual officer should use their discretion in enforcing this order and always keep the intent of the order in mind.

This Sixteenth Supplement to Public Order shall be effective immediately and shall remain in effect until superseded, amended, modified or rescinded.
