Culver City's community garden was located at 10860 Culver Boulevard near the intersection of Elenda St and Culver Blvd. On January 24, 2022, City Council adopted Ordinance 2022-001 which allowed for the construction on that site for a three-story community center and up to 12 affordable housing units. This project required that the community garden be relocated. PRCS has analyzed various park sites and on April 10, 2023, City Council approved PRCS to relocate the community garden to both Syd Kronenthal Park and Veterans Memorial Park. This project will fund the supplies and labor to build two community gardens, one at each site.

Council Adopted Priority Explanation

This project is driven by giving community members who do not have a green space, such as residents of apartment complexes or condominiums, the opportunity to garden their own fruits and vegetables. The locations were approved by City Council on 4/10/2023.

Consequences if Project is Not Approved

Currently, Culver City does not have a community garden. If not approved, Culver City will continue to not have a community garden, which is not recommended by residents, City Council, or the PRCS department.

New Revenues or Ongoing Cost Savings Explanation

In 2021, the annual cost of a community garden plot was \$30. For 10 plots at each location, this would add \$600 annually to the PRCS revenue. The annual cost could also be adjusted higher once the community garden has been built.

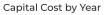

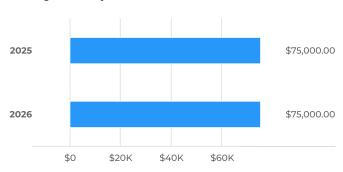

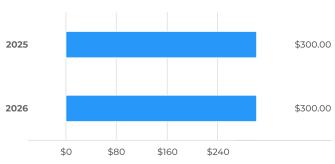
