The intent of this Resolution is to amend the bylaws to allow the Immediate Past President to fill an unexpected vacancy in the office of the President for the remaining vacating President's term. The League indicates that this change to the bylaws would also give the current Vice Presidents (First and Second) ample time to prepare for their role as President.
		While the Legislative Program does not provide guidance on this matter, staff does not see any conflicts or problems with supporting the amendment to the bylaws. Suggested Position: Support
2.	A Resolution calling for legislation to preserve therapeutic environments for group homes and avoid impacts of overconcentration of alcohol and drug abuse recovery and treatment facilities in residential neighborhoods.	Staff agrees with the League's assertion that State and county licensing agencies should be required to confer with the City's planning agency in determining whether to grant a license to a community care facility. Further, the Legislative Program supports efforts to maintain local zoning authority.
3.	A Resolution supporting SB 593 (McGuire) [a two-year bill] and continued local flexibility for cities as they address neighborhood and fiscal impacts of temporary rentals of residential units.	Suggested Position: Support The League asserts that Transient Occupancy Taxes are a significant source of local revenue, and land use regulation and local tax collection are best overseen and implemented locally. The Legislative Program supports efforts to maintain local zoning authority and supports efforts to enhance the City's ability to require and/or collect appropriate business license fees from Culver City businesses. The Legislative Program also supports efforts to retain, expand, and attract businesses to the City that create jobs compatible with the local workforce and tax revenues for the local economy. Suggested Position: Support

4. Resolution calling upon the Governor and the Legislature to work with the League of California Cities to enact legislation or otherwise compel Southern California Edison to create a program to automatically provide direct compensation to its customers affected by prolonged electrical power outages under specified circumstances. The League was approached by the City of Rancho Palos Verdes and other cities in the South Bay region of Los Angeles County stating they have longstanding concerns with Southern California Edison (SCE) and asserting SCE's ineffective process by which customers' claims for compensation are addressed. They desire to obtain the League's assistance in correcting that process. The Public Works Director believes that changing the compensation claims process could result in an increase in electrical rates for rate payers.
