ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF CULVER CITY, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING SECTIONS 5.03.030 (PERMANENT WATER CONSERVATION REQUIREMENTS), 5.03.035 (LEVEL WATER SUPPLY SHORTAGE REQUIREMENTS) 5.03.040 2 WATER SUPPLY **SHORTAGE** (LEVEL REQUIREMENTS) OF CHAPTER 5.03. CONSERVATION **AND** WATER SUPPLY SHORTAGE PROGRAM. OF THE CULVER CITY MUNICIPAL CODE.

WHEREAS, on November 9, 2009, the City Council adopted Chapter 5.03 of the Culver City Municipal Code (CCMC), establishing the Culver City Water Conservation and Water Supply Shortage Program; and

WHEREAS, on January 17, 2014, Governor Jerry Brown declared a drought emergency urging reduction of water usage statewide by 20%; and

WHEREAS, on March 17, 2015, the State Water Resource Control Board (Water Board) adopted an expanded emergency regulation to safeguard the state's remaining water supplies.

WHEREAS, the amount of precipitation received during the winter of 2015 failed to adequately replenish the state's water supplies and, on April 1, 2015, the Governor enacted mandatory water use restrictions and imposed a mandatory 25% reduction of water usage statewide; and

WHEREAS, on July 23, 2015, in response to these mandates, the City Council enhanced its minimum water use restrictions and amended the framework to enact three additional levels of increasingly restrictive water use limitations (Level 1 being the least restrictive). Also on July 23, 2015, the City Council declared the existence of a Level 2 water supply shortage condition and required swimming pools and spas be equipped with

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covers that reduce evaporation. The City also developed (and continues to implement) a citywide Water Conservation Plan, set aside funds to implement projects and programs aimed at reducing water use, and developed a website to keep the community informed of water conservation opportunities, programs and regulatory developments; and

WHEREAS, on May 9, 2016, in response to the El Niño winter of 2016, which brought a significant amount of precipitation that replenished water supplies primarily located in northern California, the Governor issued an Executive Order (Order) that imposed permanent water use restrictions and instructed the Water Board to adjust existing emergency water conservation regulations through the end of January 2017 that acknowledged the differing water supply conditions across the state. The Order also required the Water Board to work with the California Department of Water Resources (Water Resources) to develop new water use targets as part of a permanent framework to adhere to the Water Conservation Act of 2009 (SB X7-7), which requires a 20% reduction in urban water use by 2020; and

water retailers to submit documentation revealing their plan to achieve the 20% urban water use reduction by 2020 and demonstrating their ability to meet the water supply needs of their customers over the following three years (a.k.a. "Stress Test"); and

WHEREAS, Golden State Water (GSW) and the Los Angeles Department of Water and Power (LADWP) submitted Stress Tests adhering to these requirements that were reviewed and approved by Water Board staff. The Stress Test demonstrated LADWP's ability to meet the water needs of their customers over the following three years and eliminated their existing 14% water use reduction mandate, however, Los Angeles Mayor Eric Garcetti announced a voluntary water use reduction target of 20%. Similarly,

GSW's 16% water use reduction mandate became voluntary and they increased their residential landscape watering days from two to three times per week; and

WHEREAS, on August 10, 2016, in response to these developments, the Sustainability Subcommittee of the City Council recommended: (1) replacing the existing Level 2 water supply shortage condition, with the declaration of a Level 1 water supply shortage condition; and (2) several amendments to CCMC Chapter 5.03, in order to facilitate the City's compliance with the regulations and mandates established by the Order and implemented through the Restrictions.

NOW THEREFORE, the City Council of the City of Culver City, California,

DOES HEREBY ORDAIN as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 5.03.030 of the Culver City Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows (deletions indicated by strikethrough text; additions indicated by underlined text):

§ 5.03.030 PERMANENT WATER CONSERVATION REQUIREMENTS; PROHIBITION AGAINST WASTE.

The following water conservation requirements are effective at all times and are permanent. Violations of this Section will be considered waste and an unreasonable use of water.

- A. Limits on watering hours. Watering or irrigating of lawn, landscape or other vegetated area with potable water is prohibited between the hours of 9:00–8:00 a.m. and 5:00–7:00 p.m., Pacific Standard Time, on any day, except by use of a hand-held bucket or similar container, a hand-held hose equipped with a positive, self-closing, water-shut-off nozzle or device, or for very short periods of time for the express purpose of adjusting or repairing an irrigation system. Watering outdoor landscaping within 48 hours after measurable precipitation is prohibited.
- B. Limit on watering duration. Watering or irrigating of lawn, landscape or other vegetated area with potable water using a landscape irrigation system or a watering device that is not continuously attended is limited to no more than 45–10 minutes of watering per day, per station. This Subsection does not apply to landscape irrigation systems that exclusively

use very-low-flow, drip-type irrigation systems, when no emitter produces more than two gallons of water per hour, and weather-based controllers or stream rotor sprinklers that meet a 70% efficiency standard. Public parks and public and school playing fields may be watered in a frequency and duration that maintains their usability, without limitation; however, watering is prohibited between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m., Pacific Standard Time, on any day.

- C. No excessive water flow or runoff. Watering or irrigating of any lawn, landscape or other vegetated area in a manner that causes or allows excessive water flow or runoff onto an adjoining sidewalk, driveway, street, alley, gutter or ditch is prohibited.
- D. No washing down hard or paved surfaces. Washing down hard or paved surfaces, including but not limited to, sidewalks, walkways, driveways, parking areas, tennis courts, patios or alleys, is prohibited except when necessary to alleviate safety or sanitary hazards, and then only by use of a hand-held bucket or similar container, a hand-held hose equipped with a positive, self-closing, water-shut-off device, a low-volume, high-pressure cleaning machine equipped to recycle any water used, or a low-volume, high-pressure water broom.
- E. Obligation to fix leaks, breaks or malfunctions. Excessive use, loss or escape of water through breaks, leaks or other malfunctions in the water user's plumbing or distribution system for any period of time after such escape of water should have reasonably been discovered and corrected, and in no event more than seven days of receiving notice from the City, is prohibited.
- F. Re-circulating water required for decorative water fountains and decorative water features. Operating a decorative water fountain or other decorative water feature that does not use re-circulated water is prohibited.
- G. Limits on washing vehicles. Using water to wash or clean a vehicle, including but not limited to, any automobile, truck, van, bus, motorcycle, boat or trailer, whether motorized or not, is prohibited, except by use of a hand-held bucket or similar container, or a hand-held hose equipped with a positive, self-closing, water-shut-off nozzle or device. This Subsection does not apply to any commercial car washing facility.
- H. Drinking water served upon request only. Eating or drinking establishments, including but not limited to, a restaurant, hotel, cafe, cafeteria, bar, or other public place where food or drinks are sold, served, or offered for sale, are prohibited from providing drinking water to any person unless expressly requested.

- I. Commercial lodging establishments must provide guests option to decline daily linen services. Hotels, motels and other commercial lodging establishments must provide customers the option of not having towels and linen laundered daily. Commercial lodging establishments must prominently display notice of this option in each bathroom—guest room, using clear and easily understood language.
- J. No installation of single-pass cooling systems. Installation of single-pass cooling systems is prohibited in buildings requesting new water service.
- K. No installation of non-re-circulating water systems in commercial car wash and laundry systems. Installation of non-re-circulating water systems is prohibited in new commercial conveyor car wash and new commercial laundry systems.
- L. Restaurants required to use water-conserving, dish-wash spray valves. Food preparation establishments, such as restaurants or cafes, are prohibited from using non-water-conserving, dish-wash spray valves.
- M. Commercial car wash systems. Effective on January 1, 2012, all commercial conveyor car wash systems must have installed operational recirculating water systems, or must have secured a waiver of this requirement from the City.
- N. Pool and spa covers required. All swimming pools and spas shall be equipped with a cover of the type that will reduce evaporation.
- O. <u>Irrigation Prohibition</u>. Watering ornamental turf on public street medians is prohibited.

SECTION 2. Section 5.03.035 of the Culver City Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows (deletions indicated by strikethrough text):

§ 5.03.035 LEVEL 1 WATER SUPPLY SHORTAGE.

A. Determination and declaration. A Level 1 Water Supply Shortage exists when the City determines, at its sole discretion, that, due to drought or other water supply conditions, a water supply shortage or threatened shortage exists and a consumer-demand reduction is necessary to make more efficient use of water and appropriately respond to existing water conditions. Upon its declaration of a Level 1 Water Supply Shortage

condition, the City will implement the mandatory Level 1 conservation measures identified in this Section.

- B. Additional water conservation measures. In addition to the prohibited uses of water identified in § 5.03.030, the following water conservation requirements apply during a declared Level 1 Water Supply Shortage:
- 1. Limits on watering days. Watering or irrigating of lawn. landscape or other vegetated area with potable water is limited to three days per week, on a schedule that may be established and posted by the City, at the discretion of the Director of Public Works. During the months of November through March, watering or irrigating of lawn, landscape or other vegetated area with potable water is limited to no more than one day per week, on a schedule that may be established and posted by the City, at the discretion of the Director of Public Works. This provision does not apply to landscape irrigation zones that exclusively use very-low-flow, drip-type irrigation systems, when no emitter produces more than two gallons of water per hour. This provision also does not apply to watering or irrigating by use of a hand-held bucket or similar container, a hand-held hose equipped with a positive, self-closing, water-shut-off nozzle or device, or for very short periods of time for the express purpose of adjusting or repairing an irrigation system.
- 2. Obligation to fix leaks, breaks or malfunctions. All leaks, breaks, or other malfunctions in the water user's plumbing or distribution system must be repaired within 72 hours of notification by the City, unless other arrangements are made with the City.

SECTION 3. Section 5.03.040 of the Culver City Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows (deletions indicated by strikethrough text; additions indicated by underlined text):

§ 5.03.040 LEVEL 2 WATER SUPPLY SHORTAGE.

- A. Determination and declaration. A Level 2 Water Supply Shortage exists when the City determines, at its sole discretion, that, due to drought or other water supply conditions, a water supply shortage or threatened shortage exists and a consumer-demand reduction is necessary to make more efficient use of water and appropriately respond to existing water conditions. Upon its declaration of a Level 2 Water Supply Shortage condition, the City will implement the mandatory Level 2 conservation measures identified in this Section.
- B. Additional conservation measures. In addition to the prohibited uses of water identified in §§ 5.03.030 and 5.03.035, the following additional water conservation requirements apply during a declared Level 2 Water Supply Shortage:
- 1. <u>Limits on watering Watering</u>-days. Watering or irrigating of lawn, landscape or other vegetated area with potable water is limited to two days per week, on a schedule that may be established and posted by the City, at the discretion of the Director of Public Works. During the months of November through March, watering or irrigating of lawn, landscape or other vegetated area with potable water is limited to no more than one day per week, on a schedule that may be established and posted by the City, at the discretion of the Director of Public Works. This provision does not apply to landscape irrigation zones that exclusively use very-low-flow, drip-type irrigation systems, when no emitter produces more than two gallons of water per hour. This provision also does not apply to watering or irrigating by use of

a hand-held bucket or similar container, a hand-held hose equipped with a positive, self-closing, water-shut-off nozzle or device, or for very short periods of time for the express purpose of adjusting or repairing an irrigation system.

- 2. Obligation to fix leaks, breaks or malfunctions. All leaks, breaks, or other malfunctions in the water user's plumbing or distribution system must be repaired within 48 hours of notification by the City, unless other arrangements are made with the City.
- 3. Limits on filling ornamental lakes or ponds. Filling or refilling ornamental lakes or ponds is prohibited, except to the extent needed to sustain aquatic life, provided that such animals are of significant value and have been actively managed within the water feature prior to declaration of a supply shortage level under this Chapter.
- 4. Limits on washing vehicles. Using water to wash or clean a vehicle, including but not limited to, any automobile, truck, van, bus, motorcycle, boat or trailer, whether motorized or not, is prohibited, except by use of a hand-held bucket or similar container, a hand-held hose equipped with a positive, self-closing, water-shut-off nozzle or device, by high-pressure, low-volume wash systems, or at a commercial car washing facility that utilizes a re-circulating water system to capture or reuse water.
- 5. Pool and spa covers required. All swimming pools and spas shall be equipped with a cover of the type that will reduce evaporation.

SECTION 4. Pursuant to Section 614 of the City Charter, this Ordinance shall be introduced and adopted at one and the same meeting and shall take effect immediately upon its adoption by a four-fifths vote of the City Council. Pursuant to Sections 616 and 621 of the City Charter, prior to the expiration of fifteen (15) days after the adoption, the City Clerk shall cause this Ordinance, or a summary thereof, to be

1	published in the Culver City News and shall post this Ordinance or a summary thereof in at
2	least three places within the City.
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4	SECTION 5. The City Council hereby declares that, if any provision, section,
5	subsection, paragraph, sentence, phrase or word of this ordinance is rendered or declared
6	invalid or unconstitutional by any final action in a court of competent jurisdiction or by
7	reason of any preemptive legislation, then the City Council would have independently
8	adopted the remaining provisions, sections, subsections, paragraphs, sentences, phrases
9	or words of this ordinance and as such they shall remain in full force and effect.
